Usually the seasonal low prices for gas and diesel are from mid-December to mid-February. If we look at 3 year and 5 year historical charts, now is the time of year that prices start to rise all the way throughout the summer. Is now the right time to buy? To hit the absolute bottom of the fuel market is very difficult, now and then we do buy just at the right time. But most times we want to look at what is the downside for prices and what is the upside. History would tell us that in February there is a better chance for the fuel markets to rise than to decline.




Propane has shown us bigger price increases than we were expecting. Last year had record inventories that kept

prices low. This year, we started out the fall with more crop drying demand, add to it a cold December, and to top it off there were huge increases in exports due to the expansion of new terminals in the Gulf of Mexico that are capable of shipping propane all over the world. The improvements to the Panama Canal also allows larger vessels to deliver to the Far East at a lower cost than before.

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## Where does all the knowledge come from?

We get asked, "where do you get your information that you tell your customers?" Naturally, we read bulletins and do research for information, which is helpful, but the most important learning experience we have is from you, our customer. Sometimes the textbook version just doesn't work with Petroleum Operations Minnesota weather.

#### So what did we learn this winter concerning winter fuels?

The cold blast in December prompted some phone calls from our customers that were experiencing filter plugging. Some of the issues we had were actually on the storage tanks. We immediately tested some of the fuel and cut open the filters to find there was generally nothing wrong, other than the fuel did not have the cold flow blend it should have.

The cause can be related to several things. The first is water. Naturally, the water in the bottom of the tank would be frozen, but if the filter was doing its job as time went on, there could be water collected in the filter, along with some rust or debris clogging it up.

The easy fix is to replace your filter just before freeze-up to make sure that one of the potential issues is eliminated.

Filters should be replaced at a minimum of 2 times per year. We recommend a filter change once late in the fall, and then again in the spring. If you are needing to replace filters on your storage tanks more often than that, it may be telling you it is time to clean out that storage tank. It is a good practice to clean your tank every few years.

But then we had cases where there were new filters on the tank or equipment, and it took several filters that just kept clogging up; what then? That would lead us to look at proper blending of #1 fuel, #2 fuel and additives. If we start out with a tank that is 1/4 full of summer fuel, and we top off the tank with winter fuel, that tank, along with all of your equipment is not prepared for a cold blast like we received in December. It may only be good to 10 below versus 30 below. The answer is to try, as hard as it is, to get winter fuel in your tanks and equipment as soon as possible in the fall.

Just like too much medicine is not a good thing, neither is too much additive. Or worse yet, 2 different types or brands of additive. Either additive may be good alone, but put them together and it may result in a counter reaction. We have actual cases whereby the fuel had to be disposed of.

During the coldest months of the year, we blend 70% #2 diesel, and 30% #1 diesel, plus our winter additive, and this has shown the best results.

## Four auto maintenance mistakes to avoid this spring

There's no getting around it: if you want your car to run smoothly for years to come, you need to perform some basic upkeep. Start this spring off on the

right foot by avoiding these maintenance faux pas.

1. If you run snow tires and don't run all season tires, changing your tires at the wrong time or as soon as the snow starts to melt is a risky bet. Play it safe and wait until snowstorm warnings wind down and the temperature outside climbs above 44 °F. Anything lower, and the rubber on your summer tires will stiffen and lose traction. It's an equally bad idea to keep your winter tires on year-round. Not only are snow tires less efficient than summer models, but you'll also wear them out twice as fast if you

don't make the switch.

- 2. Neglecting spring tune-ups. Over the winter, the fluids that keep your car running smoothly are put to the test. It's important to check their levels come spring and to refill as needed. Don't forget to take a peek beneath your car as well; rough winter roads often take a toll on your vehicle's underbelly.

#### **Art Templin**


