

On Consumers' Side

MILESTONES OF FIRST 25 YEARS

March, 1935: C. W. Anderson and Arthur Lueders met with Martin Larson of Midland Cooperatives, Inc., at Chaska city hall to discuss organizing a cooperative to serve Carver county with petroleum products.

July 28, 1935: Emmons Olson, C. W. Anderson, Arthur Lueders and Walter Lundborg met with Martin Larson at District 24 schoolhouse to follow up on first meeting. They agreed to incorporate and start selling 150 shares of stock at \$10 each.

Sept. 14, 1935: C. W. Anderson, William Willems, Fred Meuwissen, Harry Rolf and Gerhard Schneewind incorporated the association.

Oct. 1, 1935: First annual meeting was called to order at Cologne city hall by temporary chairman C. W. Anderson, with 47 of the 89 stockholders present. They elected as their first board of directors Edward C. Johnson, Frank Louis, Herman Wittsack, Ben Hallgren, L. T. Vos, Harry Rolf and Victor Rolf. Theo Boehmke read the by-laws and they were explained by Al Howalt and Martin Larson of Midland. Members accepted them.

Oct. 8, 1935: At the first board meeting, Edward C. Johnson was elected president, Frank Louis vice-president, and Herman Wittsack secretary-treasurer. A meeting with Home Oil Co. was scheduled for Oct. 10.

Oct. 10, 1935: The secretary was authorized to advertise in the Chaska paper for truck drivers and a manager. The cooperative agreed to purchase from Home Oil Co. its bulk petroleum plant and truck tanks for \$2,500, with \$500 down and the balance to be paid at the rate of ½ cent per gallon of sales, 6% interest on the unpaid balance.

Oct. 23, 1935: Arthur Lueders was appointed manager and Arthur Am End and L. H. Wirtz bulk petroleum salesmen.

Nov. 7, 1935: First delivery of gasoline to patrons, obtained from Glencoe Co-op Ass'n.

Nov. 25, 1935: Closed deal with Skelly Oil Co. to buy bulk plant inventory.

Dec. 3, 1935: With Secretary Wittsack in hospital, Ben Hallgren was appointed secretary pro tem.

Jan. 7, 1936: Directors authorized to attempt to set up outlets for gasoline in Carver and at creamery in Waconia. Passed motion to deduct accounts more than 90 days old from drivers' pay checks.

March 3, 1936: First stock certificates issued.

March 7, 1936: Purchased inventory of Home Oil Co. from Harold Bongard for \$198.65.

April 7, 1936: Agreed to pay secretary \$15 a month. Allen Luetke will get two gasoline pumps and underground tanks at his Waconia station.

May 5, 1936: The board elected A. O. Anderson to the board to replace Herman Wittsack, who had died.

June 2, 1936: L. T. Vos elected first delegate to Midland annual meeting.

Sept. 29, 1936: 6% interest paid on outstanding stock.

FIRST SERVICE STATION, COLOGNE

Oct. 6, 1936: Fifty stockholders present at first annual meeting. Cy Howalt and John Vandermyde of Midland were speakers. Sales were \$19,550 and savings totaled \$975.

Dec. 8, 1936: Applied for loan to St. Paul Bank for Cooperatives. Granted loan of \$2,500 June 18, 1937.

Jan. 25, 1937: Discussed with Watertown area people the idea of installing a bulk plant at Watertown.

Jan. 27, 1937: Charles Johnson, John P. Cebulla, Carl Lemke, Albert Felt and Mike Neaton were named to help organize members at Watertown.

July 6, 1937: Watertown members subscribed \$600 in stock, and bulk tanks were ordered from Midland.

Oct. 5, 1937: At the second annual meeting, all directors resigned to give Watertown representation on the board. Johnson, Vos and Haligren were elected to represent Cologne; Felt, Meyer and Lemke were elected from Watertown, and A. O. Anderson was elected member-at-large.

Dec. 9, 1937: Manager Lueders resigned to take job with Sauk Centre co-op.

Jan. 12, 1938: Henry Leikam hired as mangaer at \$100 per month, with request he attend Midland managers' school for five weeks, co-op paying half the cost.

Home Oil Co. cancelled contract for service station.

May 11, 1939: Otto Schroeder hired at \$65 a month.

June 18, 1940: Installed 12,000-gallon tank at Watertown.

Sept. 12, 1940: Members voted to increase authorized capital stock from \$7,500 to \$20,000. Carl Lemke resigned from the board because he was going into the Navy and Alfred Milschewsky was elected to replace him.

Dec. 12, 1940: Directors voted to stay with Midland as petroleum supplier, turning down offer of W. H. Barber.

June 16, 1941: Papers signed for Waconia service station. G. Quass hired as operator.

July 10, 1941: Joe Salden hired at Cologne for \$75 a month.

May 5, 1942: Members elected P. J. Meuleners to replace L. T. Vos, who resigned as a director.

April 15, 1943: Invested \$450 in war bonds.

May 4, 1943: Otto Hoese replaced Albert Felt as director.

Spring, 1944: Joe Salden and Henry Leikam left for military service. Hector Hanson hired as manager. Sept. 14, 1944: Nannard Anderson became manager succeeding Hector Hanson.

Dec. 12, 1944: Paid mortgage in full on Waconia station.

May 1, 1945: Members voted to raise authorized stock to \$50,000 and interest on stock reduced from 6% to 4%.

Sept. 13, 1945: Contracted with Home Lumber Co. to build addition to Waconia station. Eugene Lindner manager succeeded Quass.

Jan. 10, 1946: Directors authorized to buy Cologne service station if not over \$5,000. Another bulk petroleum truck purchased for Watertown. Leikam returned from service, rehired as manager and sent to Universal milker school.

April 11, 1946: Salden returned from service and sent to milker school.

July 11, 1946: Let bid to Mayer Lumber Co. for \$1,833 to build service station at Mayer.

Nov. 14, 1946: Herbert Luetke appointed to replace A. O. Anderson, who resigned as director.

May 6, 1947: Members voted at the annual meeting to send a heifer to Europe as a war relief project.

Sept. 25, 1947: Leased out Mayer station to operators.

Feb. 12, 1948: Directors asked for authority to sell \$25,000 worth of preferred stock to build Cologne service station.

April 19, 1948: Authorized sale of Mayer station at \$5,000 less pumps.

May 4, 1948: Paul I. Olson elected as director to replace Ben Hallgren, who declined to run. Authorized capital stock was raised to \$70,000 common and \$30,000 preferred. Board elected William Hoernemann as president. The 10-share limit was cancelled and all earnings to be paid in stock. June 11, 1948: Alfred Milschewsky resigned as director, Hallgren appointed to fill vacancy and resumed position as secretary-treasurer.

Jan. 10, 1950: Closed deal with Paul Effertz for \$8,500 for garage and exchange for frontage on Highway 212.

May 9, 1950: Let contract for Cologne service station, \$13,833.

Nov. 14, 1950: First directors' meeting in new station.

Jan. 8, 1952: Voted to pay 4% interest on preferred stock, 3% on common.

March 11, 1952: Walter Schmidt appointed as director to replace Edward C. Johnson, who resigned.

May 6, 1952: Annual meeting and open house at new station. Authorized increase in capital stock to \$150,-000 common, \$50,000 preferred. Interest no longer paid on common stock.

Jan. 13, 1953: Hoernemann resigned, Olson replaced him as president. Harley Cederstrom appointed as director. Issued call to revolve stock given as patronage refunds up to and including 1938, for cash.

Jan. 5, 1954: Called in \$6,000 in preferred stock.

Feb. 9, 1954: Retired more common stock issued in 1939, 1940 and 1941.

Sept. 21, 1954: Called in common stock issued in 1942 and 1943.

Jan. 11 and March 8, 1955; Called in \$8,000 worth of preferred stock.

August 9, 1955: Frank Karnitz appointed to replace Walter Schmidt.

Oct. 21, 1955: Called in 1944 stock.

Jan. 10, 1956: Called in final \$12,500 of preferred stock.

March 6, 1956: Called in 1945 common stock issue.

May 1, 1956: Alvin Hilk elected to replace Herbert Luetke on board. Sept. 15, 1956: Agreed to build fertilizer warehouse at Cologne for \$2,500.

Nov. 13, 1956: Called in 1946 stock. March 12, 1957: Called in 1947 stock.

June 1, 1957: Completed negotiations to separate Watertown bulk plant from our organization. They joined Watertown Cooperative Grain and Fuel Ass'n.

Aug. 1, 1957: Nicholas Eiden, Charles Eggers and Gordon Wickenhauser appointed to fill director vacancies when Watertown members resigned. Nov. 13, 1957: Called in 1948 stock.

Jan. 14, 1958: Gale Anderson hired to replace Nannard Anderson who resigned as truck driver after 14 years.

Oct. 24, 1958: 1949 and 1950 stock retired.

June 9, 1959: Decided to sell land on Highway 212 east of Wirtz tavern for \$250.


Oct. 24, 1959: Called in 1951 and 1952 common stock for cash.







